- 15 CHAIRMAN PHILLIPS: Thank you,

- 4 Thank you, Commissioners, for convening
- 5 today's community hearing in Formal Case No. 1162.
- 6 This is the second community hearing that you've held,
- 7 I believe in 30 days, and in my view it recognizes or
- 8 acknowledges your commitment and acknowledgement of
- 9 the need for community input. Most importantly, I
- 10 want to thank our community witnesses who've taken
- 11 time from their busy schedules to participate in this
- 12 virtual hearing. Your voices are important.
- During my tenure as People's Counsel, I
- 14 have remained committed to ensuring that consumers
- 15 have a voice and a seat at the table when important
- 16 decisions are made.
- 17 As with all cases involving rates,
- 18 charges, and changes to services, on broad policy
- 19 issues community input is critically important and
- 20 facilitates the Commission's ability to render a
- 21 decision that is in the public interest and discharge
- 22 of our respective roles, the Office of the People's

- 1 Counsel, and the Public Service Commission, are
- 2 charged with performing a critical public
- 3 responsibility.
- 4 Our charge has never weighed so heavily
- 5 as it does today in light of the coronovirus pandemic.
- 6 Consumers are faced with hard choices as they guard
- 7 their health and stretch their dollars. At the same
- 8 time, we cannot lose sight of our obligation to affirm
- 9 and advance the environmental, economic, and
- 10 sustainability requirements of the District of
- 11 Columbia. And we understand the Utility's interest in
- 12 being financially stable.
- 13 I look forward to hearing from today's

I'm deeply concerned about 18 facilities. That is not consistent with DC's clean 18 climate change. When we burn the gas that is the 19 energy plans and climate commitments, and it is 19 subject of this rate case, we create CO2 that worsens 20 fundamentally inequitable to ask DC families 20 the climate crisis, creating more deadly heatwaves,

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21 storms, draughts, and dangerous flooding.

I'm deeply concerned that the District

21 struggling to pay the bills amid this deep recession

22 to pay more than large commercial polluters. Any rate

- 1 is not making any measurable progress in reducing CO2
- 2 emissions from gas quite to the contrary to our
- 3 measurable progress on the electricity side. As a
- 4 result of this lack of progress, I have recently
- 5 personally disconnected my DC home from the gas supply
- 6 and electrified all former gas appliances. I heat my
- 7 home with a heat pump, my hot water with a heat pump
- 8 water heater, and I cook on a fantastic induction
- 9 stove.
- 10 Over the course of a year, our home is
- 11 fully powered by clean and renewable energy generated
- 12 right here from the solar panels installed directly on
- 13 the roof of our home.
- 14 In this rate case, Washington Gas has
- 15 filed an application that does not take the District's
- 16 climate commitments into account at all. Testimony
- 17 filed in this rate case by the Environmental Defense
- 18 Funds points out that this rate application fails to
- 19 take into account the need to modernize the gas
- 20 planning and rate design process in response to the
- 21 District's climate commitments.
- Those things can't be separated. You

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- 1 can't first have a rate plan and then you have a
- 2 climate plan. Those need to be integrated. I and
- 3 many other DC ratepayers agree with the many important
- 4 issues raised by EDF and urge the Commission to order
- 5 WGL to include them in the current and future rate
- 6 cases.
- 7 In particular, the Commission should
- 8 enhance and augment the gas supply planning process.
- 9 EDF points out that the current five year gas supply
- 10 planning process is outdated and no longer aligned
- 11 with the District's climate goals.
- 12 For example, Washington Gas estimates
- 13 that gas sales and through-put will continue to
- 14 increase over the next five years even though the
- 15 District's energy and climate commitments call for a
- 16 reduction in energy usage and GHG emissions.
- 17 The District's climate commitments
- 18 require a thorough demonstration and consideration of
- 19 the company's resources, timing all in costs and
- 20 capabilities to understand the available alternatives
- 21 and the tradeoffs involved in continuing to rely on
- 22 gas.

1 Such a planning process must be

- 2 connected to the rate recovery in order to bring the
- 3 necessary accountability and discipline to utility
- 4 decision making in an area of rigorous climate
- 5 commitments.
- We also believe, as EDS has stressed,
- 7 that the Commission should open an integrated planning
- 8 docket for both WGL and Pepco. EDF notes that after
- 9 WGL proposes a long range gas plan which presents its
- 10 supply plans in concert with its GHG emission
- 11 reduction efforts, it will be necessary to coordinate
- 12 such efforts with the electric utility's capabilities
- 13 and plans.
- 14 In particular, to the extent that
- 15 Washington Gas may engage in cost effective,
- 16 beneficial electrification efforts, one way from the
- 17 company to comply with the District's climate
- 18 commitments is to invest in electrification which will
- 19 require a concerted involvement and coordinated
- 20 planning and execution by both WGL and the electric
- 21 utility.
- And finally, we believe that the

- 1 Commission should require Washington Gas to file a
- 2 depreciation study aligning the useful lives of gas
- 3 assets with electrification efforts and the risk of
- 4 stranded assets. EDF proposes that Washington Gas be
- 5 required to file a study on depreciation and climate
- 6 change.
- 7 The risk here is simply that the assets
- 8 that it currently seeks to recover costs for may no
- 9 longer be in place at a time when the District has
- 10 taken its climate commitment serious and electrifies,
- 11 leaving future ratepayers with dollars on the hook.
- The study should include an examination
- 13 of the potential impact of climate change policies and
- 14 laws on average service lives, reserve deficiencies,
- 15 cost of removal, and depreciation rates and customer
- 16 bills to use in the Company's next rate filing.
- 17 To conclude, the planet faces a climate
- 18 crisis. We cannot continue burning fossil fuels if we
- 19 expect the planet to survive. The old way of doing
- 20 business for DC's gas utility cannot continue. The DC
- 21 Council recognized this in 28 and when it required the
- 22 Commission to uphold its climate's commitment to

1 carbon neutrality.

2 Consistent with the new mandate, the

- 3 Commission should require Washington Gas to evolve its
- 4 business model away from gas combustion, spending
- 5 millions or even billions of ratepayers' dollars on
- 6 soon-obsolete gas infrastructure.
- 7 Instead the Commission should require
- 8 Washington Gas to evolve its business model and
- 9 Washington Gas does not appear to be prepared for such
- 10 a paradigm shift. So the Commission should lead the
- 11 utility toward it. One step in that direction is the
- 12 rejection of this proposed rate case.
- 13 I appreciate your time and attention
- 14 and I, I'm sorry if, I'm sorry if I went over, which I
- 15 probably did.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PHILLIPS: That's quite all
- 17 right. I appreciate your comments and they're
- 18 welcome. Also as you're probably aware, I want to
- 19 remind everyone listening that the Public Service
- 20 Commission after the CleanEnergy Omnibus Act of 2018
- 21 are required to take into consideration the impacts of
- 22 global climate change and the District's climate

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- 1 policies in all of our major decisions. And we do
- 2 intend to do that in this proceeding.
- 3 So we thank you for your comments and
- 4 we, we think that it will aid us in our ability to
- 5 carry out our mission. With that, we'll turn to the
- 6 next witness. Please call the next witness, please.
- 7 MS. WESTBROOK-SEDGWICK: Yes. Our next
- 8 witness is Ari Eisenstadt. Ari Eisenstadt, are you on
- 9 the line?
- 10 MR. EISENSTADT: Yes.
- 11 MS. WESTBROOK-SEDGWICK: Thank you.
- 12 You may begin.
- 13 MR. EISENSTADT: Thank you. Thank you.
- 14 Good afternoon, Chairman Phillips and Commissioner
- 15 Beverly. My name is Ari Eisenstadt. My pronouncer
- 16 him and his and I'm the DC conservation advocate for
- 17 the Audubon Naturalist Society. On behalf of our more
- 18 than 28,000 members and supporters across that the DC
- 19 metro area, I'm here to offer testimony today in
- 20 opposition of Washington Gas's request for a 14.7
- 21 percent rate increase.
- I want to begin by reminding the public

1 of the Commissioners' obligations to District

- 2 residents. The Commission's mission statement reads
- 3 "Commission of the Public Service Commission of
- 4 District of Columbia is to serve the public interest
- 5 by ensuring that financially healthy utility companies
- 6 provide safe, reliable, and quality utility services
- 7 at reasonable rates for DC customers."
- 3 Approving Washington Gas's proposed
- 9 rate increase defies the Commission's charge to serve
- 10 the public interest. For a rate increase to serve
- 11 ratepayers, it should reasonably come with an
- 12 assurance of improved performance. Washington Gas'
- 13 performance is directly tied to the qualities of
- 14 safety, quality, and reliability. As of 2018,
- 15 Washington Gas's performance must also be measured by
- 16 their ability to meet merger agreements pursuant to
- 17 Formal Case No. 1142.
- Washington Gas has failed to meet these
- 19 basic performance standards by which the Commission
- 20 must judge the Utility's current request. As many are
- 21 aware, natural gas is composed primarily of methane,
- 22 an extremely potent greenhouse gas. On its own,

- 1 methane from fracked gas is responsible for 23.1
- 2 percent of greenhouse gas emissions in Washington, DC.
- 3 As many are also aware, Washington Gas is legally
- 4 obligated to support DC's policy commitments for
- 5 climate. These include 100 percent electrification, a
- 6 50 percent reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by
- 7 2032, and net carbon neutrality by 2050.
- 8 There is no conceivable way that
- 9 Washington, DC could achieve any of these goals
- 10 without addressing same portion of that 23.1 percent
- 11 of greenhouse gas emissions. This past March,
- 12 Washington Gas published its climate business plan in
- 13 response to Merger Agreement 79. This plan does not
- 14 represent any measurable emissions reductions and will
- 15 make it virtually impossible for DC to reach its 2032
- 16 and 2050 climate commitments. This business plan
- 17 represents a complete failure to meet Washington Gas'
- 18 performance requirements to support DC's climate
- 19 commitments.
- 20 To demand that District residents pay
- 21 more for a failing service that disregards public
- 22 health outcomes is amoral and contradictory to the

- 1 Public Service Commission's mission. It is also a
- 2 fact that climate change poses an imminent threat to
- 3 the health and safety of District residences.
- 4 Climate change is not a far off,
- 5 distant problem. Overwhelming flooding and stifling
- 6 heat are harming Washingtonians today and will
- 7 continue to tomorrow. Perhaps even more urgently,
- 8 methane gas today is suffocating Washingtonians in
- 9 their own neighborhoods and homes.
- When methane is released into the
- 11 atmosphere through the national gas supply chain, it
- 12 reacts with sunlight to form a tropospheric ozone.
- 13 Ozone is the major component in ground level smog,
- 14 which is a major respiratory irritant. When methane
- 15 is burned in a gas stove, it forms nitrogen dioxide.
- 16 Nitrogen dioxide is a toxic gas.
- 17 Children living in homes with a gas
- 18 stove without proper ventilation are 42 percent more
- 19 likely to develop asthma than children living in a
- 20 home without a gas stove. Tragically, the United
- 21 States does not have legal requirements for proper
- 22 stove ventilation, meaning that improper ventilation
  - Page 23
- 1 is the norm.
- 2 Nitrogen dioxide also causes
- 3 neurological and cardiological damage in children. In
- 4 concentrations generated by gas stoves, nitrogen
- 5 dioxide worsens preexisting asthma in children and
- 6 adults alike. The dangerous effects of methane gas
- 7 cannot be understated given the prevalence of asthma
- 8 in Washington, DC. Asthma rates in DC are more than
- 9 twice the national average and are particularly high
- 10 among black Washingtonians.
- 11 This has contributed to
- 12 disproportionately high COVID-19 death rates and the
- 13 deleterious effects of methane on indoor air quality
- 14 and even more dire consequences during this pandemic.
- 15 Simply put, Washington Gas has not
- 16 provided a safe service. Safety is the core to the
- 17 Commission's mission and is another area in which
- 18 Washington Gas is failing to perform. The Commission
- 19 cannot improve a rate increase for a service that
- 20 continues to endanger DC residents.
- 21 To conclude, this rate increase request
- 22 is unwarranted, undeserved, and unjust. It is an

- 1 irresponsible response to the physical and economic
- 2 devastation that the COVID-19 pandemic, at the
- 3 intersection of the climate crisis, has wrought on DC
- 4 residents.
- 5 If the Public Service Commission
- 6 approves this rate increase, it will be complicit in
- 7 perpetrating a grave injustice. If this increase were
- 8 going to result in objectively better, safer service
- 9 from a company that repeatedly falls short of
- 10 expectations, my testimony would surely differ. The
- 11 City deserves much more than Washington Gas is
- 12 offering. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRMAN PHILLIPS: Thank you for your
- 14 testimony. I just want to once again remind everybody
- 15 I appreciate the witness mentioning the mission
- 16 statement in the beginning. I want to highlight a
- 17 portion that I think that he missed. It says that
- 18 "The mission of the Pubic Service Commission of the
- 19 District of Columbia is to serve the public interest
- 20 by ensuring that financially healthy utility companies
- 21 provide safe, reliable, and quality utility services
- 22 at reasonable rates." And then it goes on to say the

- 10 We in the District need energy for
- 11 heating and cooking in our homes, businesses, and
- 12 institutions, and the utility that supplies that
- 13 energy must be allowed an income stream that will keep
- 14 it operationally and financially robust, but in
- 15 exchange, any utility must submit to and align its
- 16 activities with public policy. Those are the rules of
- 17 the road. And also commitments that Washington Gas
- 18 and its parent, AltaGas, made in the merger agreement
- 19 signed with the District in 2018.
- 20 Washington Gas promised to develop,
- 21 quote, "A long term business plan on how it can evolve
- 22 its business model to support and serve the District's

- 1 transition plan, which Washington Gas committed but
- 2 then failed to develop, is made even more urgent by
- 3 the poor condition of our old gas infrastructure. But
- 4 instead of aggressively tackling the tough problem of
- 5 how to make this transition, Washington Gas has handed
- 6 in proposals to continue its preferred business as
- 7 usual burning methane and to spend \$872 million
- 8 dollars in the next decade to replace outdated gas
- 9 infrastructure that actually needs to be mothballed as
- 10 soon as possible.
- 11 It is true that the District of
- 12 Columbia will need to dedicate funds to planning our
- 13 transition off gas, assessing which portions of our
- 14 pipe grid are in the worse condition, which
- 15 neighborhoods can be transitioned first, and how to
- 16 provide District residents with cleaner, healthier,
- 17 and in the long run more economical energy sources.
- 18 But Washington Gas has proven that they don't have the
- 19 will to undertake this work. Company management has
- 20 operated in bad faith causing us to waste precious
- 21 time and resources already.
- 22 I oppose this rate increase Washington

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- 1 2050 climate goals." Unfortunately, Washington Gas
- 2 has failed to fulfill that promise. In fact, WGL's
- 3 intent is evidenced by the company's climate business
- 4 plan released in March is about as far out of step
- 5 with the District's climate goals as could be
- 6 imagined.
- 7 I'm raising these issues, I'm raising
- 8 these issues in today's rate case discussion because
- 9 Washington Gas says it needs more money from its
- 10 ratepayers to provide services, maintain
- 11 infrastructure, and provide adequate returns to its
- 12 shareholders. This might be considered legitimate
- 13 needs. These might be considered legitimate needs
- 15 carried out the work it has agreed to in alignment
- 16 with the District's plans and policies.
- 17 It has not and evidently it does not
- 18 plan to. To be concrete, the District needs to stop
- 19 burning fossil fuels including gas in order to reach
- 20 its climate goals and to protect the health of its
- 21 residences as Ari Eisenstadt mentioned.
- 22 The need for a well-elaborated

- 1 Gas is now requesting. Thank you very much for the
- 2 opportunity to talk about this with you today.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PHILLIPS: Thank you for your
- 4 testimony. Commission Secretary, do we have anymore
- 5 preregistered witnesses?
- MS. WESTBROOK-SEDGWICK: No, sir, we
- 7 don't. And for those who joined the hearing by
- 8 telephone and would like to speak, please raise your
- 9 hand by pressing star 3. For those who joined via
- 10 computer, raise your hand, please, and we'll call
- 11 everyone in turn. Thank you. Sir, we had no
- 12 respondents.
- 13 CHAIRMAN PHILLIPS: Okay. Once again,
